## Boeing Sets Delivery Mark in May

Boeing delivered more commercial jet airplanes during May than in any previous month in the company's history when 36 airplanes were turned over to 15 customers.

Previous record had been set in March when 34 deliveries were made. May deliveries reflected a continuing change in the Boeing product line. Of the delivered aircraft, 25 were new models — 16 of them being long-bodied 727-200 trijets and nine 737 twin-jets. Nine were 707s and one was a regular 727C.

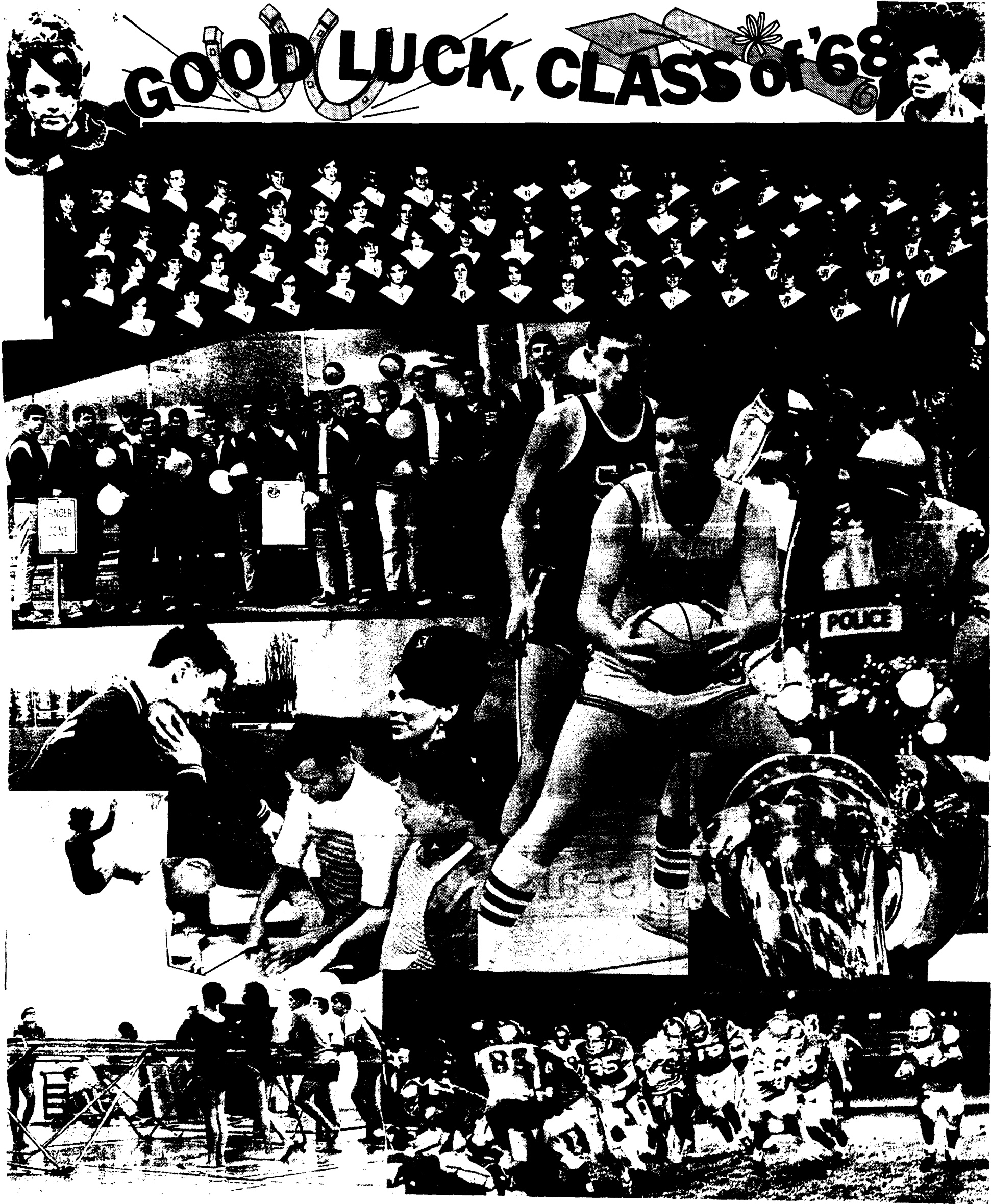

## At Hospital — Emergency Coverage Completed

With staffing of the emergency service at Valley General Hospital completed on June 1, William E. Murray, hospital administrator, said community emergency services will be contacted soon for seminars.

A fourth physician, Dr. Harold Burden, joined Drs. Victor Lombardini, V. C. Norine and Donald Rohrsen to complete the staff which gives emergency service around the clock now at the hospital in Renton.

Murray told the Hospital Advisory Council at a meeting Tuesday that representatives from the police and fire departments, coroner, sheriff's office, state patrol, industry, ambulance, medical staff and other interested agencies will be invited to participate in meetings with the object of co-ordinating emergency service.

"If we can establish better communication — for instance, if the carrier can phone the hospital while en route as to the nature of the injury the doctor and the staff could be ready when the patient arrives. We will make an all-out effort to make this emergency service most effective."

## Carco Sells 55 Big Trucks To Canadians

An order for from \$10,000,000 to \$12,000,000 in heavy construction equipment has been placed by Mica Dam Contractors in British Columbia with Pacific Car & Foundry Co. and its subsidiaries, the B.C. people revealed this week.

The contract includes 55 of the 120-ton Dart-Secard off-the-road trucks produced in Kansas City for U.S. sale and in Quebec for

Canadian and Commonwealth Seattle units for the past two months. Workmen at the Dart factory in Kansas City worked until their contract expired this week and are now on strike.

Secard, the Quebec manufacturer, was licensed by Pacific Car to build Dart trucks until 1967 when it was acquired as a subsidiary of Pacific Car.

The B.C. order also includes four articulated front-end-bucket loaders.

The Secard plant in Quebec is not affected by the strike that has tied up the Renton and

## Highline Fountain Dedicated as a Few Students Protest

Demonstrators carrying mock rifles intruded a war protest in a Thursday noon dedication of a Memorial Fountain to war dead at Highline College.

There was no incident. In the protest group, silent for the most part, were some 25 to 30 youths who stood around a banner emblazoned: "We Dedicate This Fountain to Peace and Understanding."

Nearly 200 persons were on hand for the program which dedicated the fountain to "all Washington men of the armed forces who have died since World War II."

Dr. M.A. Allan, college president, who made the short dedicatory remarks, borrowed the wording of the protest banner as he called for "a dedication of ourselves to the cause of peace and understanding for those who have given far more than we give so this campus can be more beautiful and useful to us."

The war protesters, some bearded, some clean-shaven; some long-haired, others with neat cuts; some white, some Negro; some dressed "mod," others with castoff uniform coats; included eight or 10 youths who grasped guns.

The toys looked like real rifles, and amid conspiratorial giggles, the youths sat cross-legged in front of the sign, one perched on another's shoulders, with "rifles" crossed over his chest.

They talked quietly with each other behind the sign, handing out the guns, while a speaker referred to the sadness of the day, because of Senator Robert F. Kennedy's assassination.

Dr. Allan introduced Mr. and Mrs. Donald Schultz of Kent, whose son, Pfc. David Schultz, a former Highline College student, lost his life in Vietnam several months ago.

The protesters looked uncomfortable as the majority of the crowd applauded and stood in tribute to the Schultz family.

Dr. Allan then asked each person present to observe Sunday as a day of mourning for Senator Kennedy.

Sadly noting that it was the second time in this semester that he had called for such a day of mourning, Dr. Allan then asked the group to observe two seconds of mourning "for two persons who have forfeited their lives for the common weal."

As heads were bowed, the young men who sat cross-legged with guns in their arms looked at each other, there was a whispered "put down your guns" and they also stood with bowed heads.

Dr. Allan received a suggestion that the fountain be named the Kennedy Fountain, and said it would be given to the board of trustees for action.

Throughout the ceremony, a color guard representing each of the military services stood at attention back of the landscaped plot in which the new fountain was installed. The fountain was constructed with student labor and funds provided two years ago by the Associated Student Body.

Roy Wiseman, Dave Hikian and Blaine Sorenson, students, were given much of the credit for the project, along with William Searings of the faculty.

As the fountain was turned on, the water began to play, and an Air Force flyover by three planes drowned out much of the sound. The young men who had posed with guns through the program smashed the guns to bits on the sidewalk, but the spectators paid little attention.

Most wandered off to a late lunch, a few stayed to see if the protesters would cause any disturbance.

Charlie Brown, Seattle, newly elected student body president for next year, commented that he did not think the "demonstration" was appropriate to the time and place. "It showed immaturity," Brown said.

"This fountain was dedicated to those who have given their lives since World War II. If they (the protesters) wanted to protest the Vietnam war, they should do it in another time and place," said another student.

The demonstration apparently was led by David Krumes, one of the leaders of the campus Afro-American group.

The day before the fountain dedication, dye was poured into the fountain, and an attempt made to cut off the water.

King County sheriff's deputies and campus police were on hand to make certain there was no disorder.

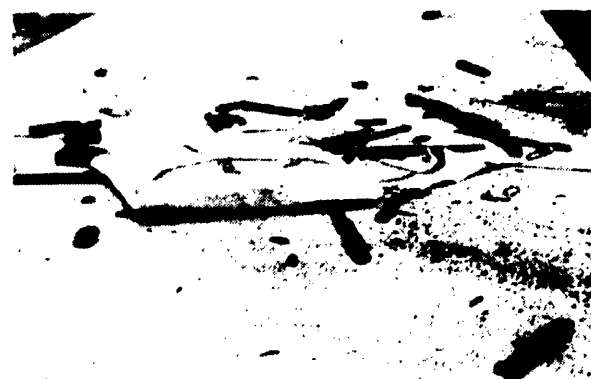

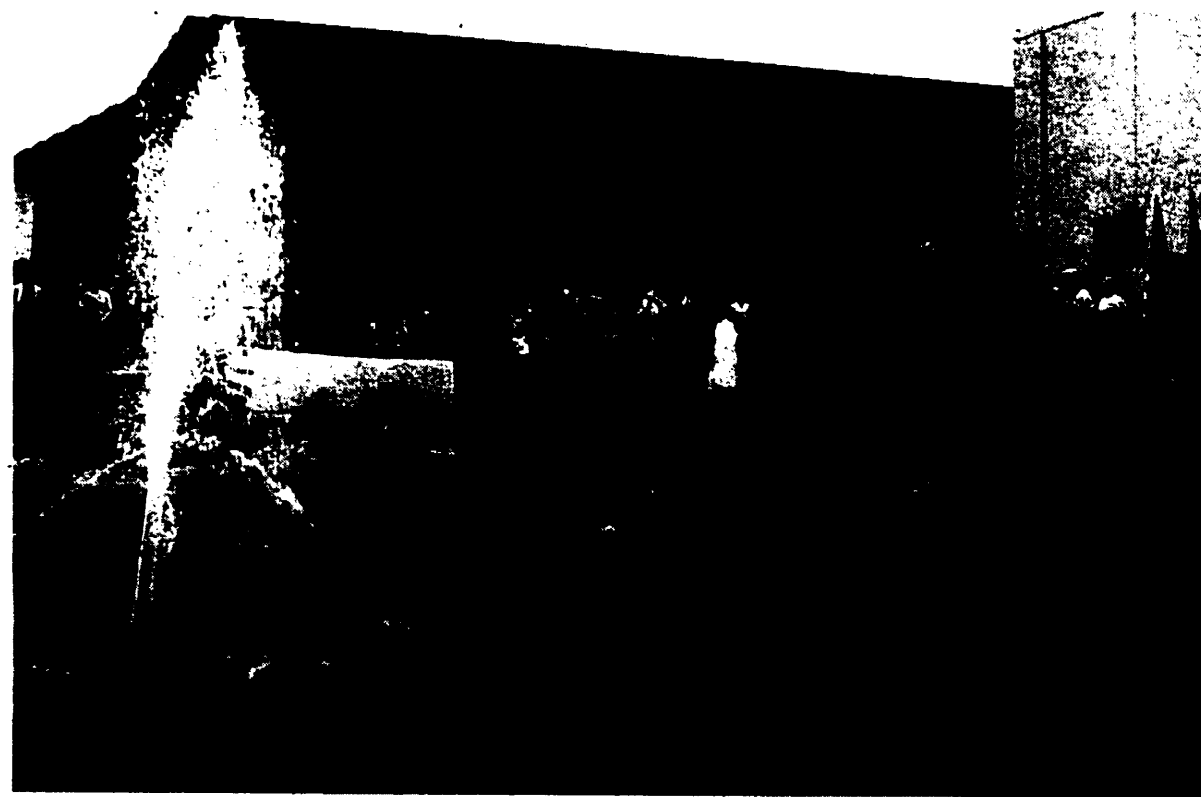
